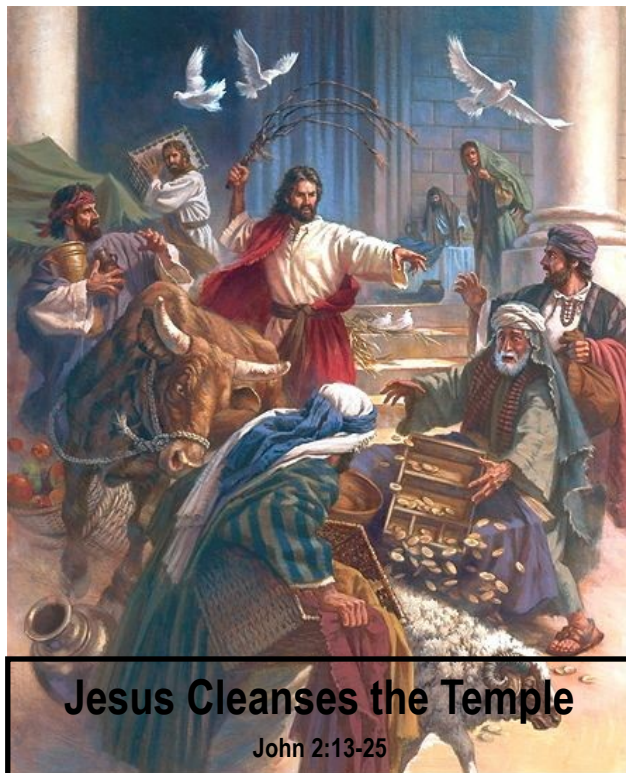

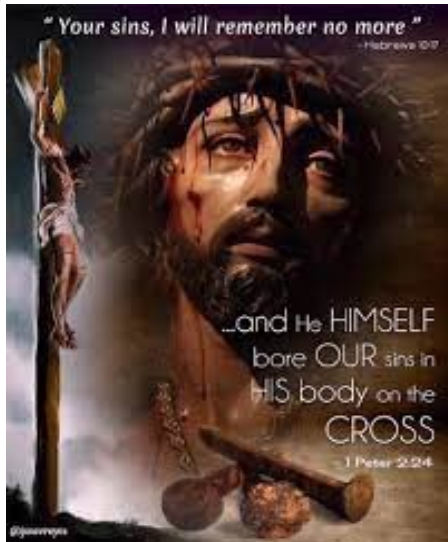

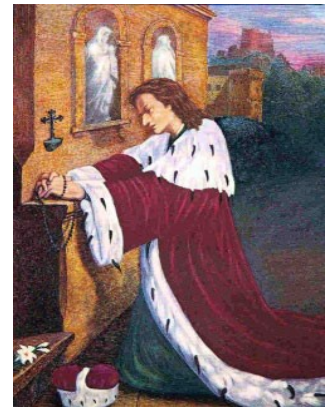

Living and Praying in Communion with the Saints.....

Saint Casimir (1458-1484)—March 4

Saint Casimir, son of the King of Poland, was born in 1458. He practised the Christian virtues with special regard to chastity and kindness to the poor and was zealous in the faith, particularly in his devotion to the Holy Eucharist and the Virgin Mary. Casimir died of consumption in 1484.



Saints Perpetua and Felicity, Martyrs (Died c. 203)—March 7

Perpetua was a young, beautiful, well-educated noblewoman of Carthage in North Africa, mother of an infant son and chronicler of the persecution of the Christians by Emperor Septimius Severus. Perpetua's mother was a Christian and her father a pagan. He continually pleaded with her to deny her faith. She refused and was imprisoned at 22.

In her diary, Perpetua describes her period of captivity: “What a day of horror! Terrible heat, owing to the crowds! Rough treatment by the soldiers! To crown all, I was tormented with anxiety for my baby.... Such anxieties I suffered for many days, but I obtained leave for my baby to remain in the prison with me, and being relieved of my trouble and anxiety for him, I at once recovered my health, and my prison became a palace to me and I would rather have been there than anywhere else.”

Despite threats of persecution and death, Perpetua, Felicity—a slave and expectant mother—and three companions, Revocatus, Secundulus and Saturninus, refused to renounce their Christian faith. For their unwillingness, all were sent to the public games in the amphitheater. There Perpetua and Felicity were beheaded, and the others killed by beasts. Felicity gave birth to a daughter a few days before the games commenced. Persecution for religious beliefs is not confined to Christians in ancient times, consider the threats and sacrifices suffered by believers today.

Saint John of God, Religious (1495-1550)—March 8

Saint John of God was born in Portugal in 1495. After a hazardous period in the military service, he chose the better way of life and devoted himself entirely to the care of the sick. Founding a hospital in Granada, Spain, he selected assistants who later formed the Order of Hospitallers of Saint John of God. He was most distinguished for his charity to the needy and the sick. Saint John died in Granada in 1550.



Saint Frances of Rome, Religious (1384-1440)—March 9

Saint Frances was born at Rome in 1384. While still young she married and had three sons. Though living at a calamitous time, she gave her goods to the poor and looked after the needs of the sick. She was remarkable in this active work for the destitute and also in cultivating the virtues of humility and patience. In 1425 she founded the Congregation of Oblates under the rule of Saint Benedict. Saint Frances died in 1440.
